AYC REPORT 2024

OVERVIEW

Addiscombe Youth Club (AYC) was created in January 2020 by parents who recognised the need for our young people in the community (age 11-15). This age group is very mobile/social media reliant and an age that does not have a social environment to safely meet and have fun. The youth club is open to all young people from our community and school friends for example are very welcome. Part of coming to AYC encourages healthy communication between the young people.

AYC is not just about socialising, we also open up discussions and tackle issues surrounding their mental wellbeing, especially in this current climate.

We promote:

Kindness

Friendship

Respect

Communication

Community Values

AYC aims to incorporate the Christian values and keep church alive through attraction rather than promotion. AYC carries the loving message acceptance and guidance through whatever we do.

AYC has 60 families on our mailing list. All information via email and we open WA groups only for trips with parent's contacts. Our E-mails include session dates information on our schedule, charities we are supporting, parish information and reminders for raffle prizes. It has been very useful to use google forms to collect important information for trips, gather survey information to make sure we are meeting our Young people's needs. All registration forms from September will take this format- easily filled in from a mobile phone.

Admission is turn up on the night and we have a group of volunteers. The DBS process is much easier, and we are very grateful for the support for safeguarding at the diocese for their help. All our volunteers have followed the safer recruitment process, obtained DBS certificates and have completed the mandatory training recommend by the Catholic, safeguarding, standards, agency. Some of our volunteers are first aid trained. I have completed Mental Health First Aid training which was so very useful and have lists of useful organisations.

Our sessions in the large hall on a Friday follow a relaxed format starting at 19.30pm with registration there is £2 entry fee this includes a strip of raffle tickets. Raffle is held at the end of the evening and is a firm favourite. Raffle prizes are donations of Toiletries, sweets/treats, socks and stationary (we ask for specific items- to be helpful to young people in this climate when money is tight). Big raffles at discos/Christmas also include vouchers for meals out/cinema/amazon -again useful prizes' for young people. Movement in school can be restrictive we encourage young people to move

around the hall, use the garden (being mindful to our neighbours) be relaxed or loud and laugh!. Gaming station is not that popular but we have it. Board games are used. Badminton net in large/outside in warmer weather and table tennis in small hall. Crafts are popular we always have marker and pens along with positive/teenage friendly stickers our bigger crafts are well thought out and really enjoyed monster energy drink cans with lights is very popular with everybody. Relaxed chats often happen in the PRC room which is a quieter space. We link our phones to speaker to play pop music throughout the evening. It is noticed that our young people have a deep sense of equality and fairness which can be explored and tested within our environment. AYC wants to support our young members in anyway we can- in the female toilets we provide a supply of sanitary products these are getting used. AYC had Sugar Rush (Tuck shop) which provides us a steady income. Our sweets and drinks mainly come from supermarkets and a Local Londis who provides us with very good prices allowing us to make profit.

Aswell as our sessions in the hall we can see the benefit of taking the young people on these trips. These trips can provide experiences that might be out of budget for families if not subsidizes, give families opportunities to spend time with other siblings, provide respite for guardians, use young people's energy and give families talking points about new experiences. This year we have added to our AYC schedule by doing some new events- remembering our young people can be with us up to 5 years it is important to provide a verity of experiences for them to interact with. Another benefit for being out and about is to see how well AYC members bond irrespective of age, gender, school – this builds self-confidence.

AYC in inclusive and try to keep costs a minimum but we are clear cost should not keep our young people from attending and if we are able to help we will. The budget we receive from our parish is mainly used to lessen the costs of trips for parents which helps give Our Young People experiences they might not have. This budget is put to very good use, and we are very grateful to have this. Our Profit also goes back to our young people by buying equipment and subsiding trips. AYC also have the use of the hall at no charge again this enables us to use profit for our Young People. When looking at trips/outings it is part of our process that we negotiate the best price possible often getting discounts as we are a Youth Club or for Group bookings.

Bouncy assault course and Ice cream van as our end of year celebration (subsidized by AYC and sponsored by LMB)

Our residential to windmill hill was fantastic so much laughter, growth and maturity. Two nights away in PGL activity camp. Thank you to our social club who pay for the coach with makes the weekend manageable for parents to afford.

To keep the link between AYC and our church community we helped at the October fair this brought lots of our member to help as we had rotas for various jobs.......

Our Christmas trip was to Oxygen trampolining trip flowed by McDonalds which is a firm favourite again we used our profits to make this manageable.

As a big group we got discounted tickets to Fairfield halls to see the pantomime.

January we hired in a self-defence group in on a Saturday afternoon- this was a very informative and energetic afternoon.

Paintballing was fully booked and at a cost to parents but heavily subsided using our budget was a fantastic full day 9-3pm the weather was dry and it was really a great day!

Working with the social club helping with hospitality opportunities gave our young people great sense of achievement and helped them learn new skills.

Some members helped with the big lunch.

Still to come we have our annual PGL and paddleboarding as our end of term activity at pinewood scouts activity centre who have generously given us a discount.

In conclusion, we believe that opening the Youth Club and providing a safe friendly environment for the young people in our community continues to work well. We constantly receive positive feedback from the parents, and we just love that we can provide this space for our young people. On this part, we would like to thank Fr Keith and Fr Tomaz for all their support in helping make this happen.

SAFEGUARDING REPORT JUNE 2024.

My name is Joanna Murphy Parish Safeguarding Representative for Our Lady of the Annunciation. I started this position in January 2024 motivated by God and the gap our parish had in this integral part of keeping everybody safe. I am working hard with the safeguarding team of the diocese to make sure all current volunteers have completed volunteer forms and get DBS checks if necessary – this process is lengthy, your cooperation is essential. I have asked that no new volunteers follow the safer recruit process until September as I pray that we will be up to date by then. All guidelines/processes are written by the Catholic Safeguarding standards Agency. I have had full support from the safeguarding Team at Southward and am very grateful for their knowledge and professionalism,

Job Role

The job role of Parish safeguarding Representative is to promote a culture of Safeguarding, where the parish community is aware of safeguarding issues and help to ensure Safeguarding is understood as an essential part of the ministry of the church.

Volunteers/DBS checks

In our parish I am committed to the safer recruitment process. The recruitment of volunteers needs to be robust process following the below procedure:

Volunteers to be introduced to me and we follow interview questions/volunteer leaflet to be shared with potential volunteer.

Volunteer form to be filled out and references to be contacted.

DBS process to be started with the safeguarding team.

ID Verification.

Mandatory safeguarding training to be completed.

Volunteer guidelines to be read and signed

Training

I attended the training day in Southwark and met with fellow PSR's in Croydon which was very helpful. The Safeguarding team from Southwark came to support our Parish by running a training morning in our small hall onit was well attended and this opportunity was used for ID verification – all that attended received a certificate. This mandatory training needs to be repeated by all volunteers every 3 years.

Conclusion

Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility. It is vital that as a parish community we continue to show commitment to Safety within our parish by continuing to follow guidelines and recommendations from the safeguarding team at Southwark and the Catholic Safeguarding Standards Agency. 1st Addiscombe Guides has been active since 1953. We celebrated our 70th birthday last year. 12th Addiscombe Brownies has been going since 1975. I suspect the 1st Addiscombe Brownies was a lot older but we kept the Wednesday pack on. As you know Girlguiding is always oversubscribed and waiting lists are huge. I keep mentioning how many units we have lost since 2010. After the Pandemic even more closed. We are desperate for volunteers. But not just people who are willing to help occasionally, we are desperate for adults to take over the insurance, organisation and administration of the units which no matter how much easier it is made electronically, is still a big ask.

I have decided to celebrate the 50th Birthday of the Brownies in October and then step down at Christmas, since I have done this since 2001 and Ellie and Sophia will have gone to University.

We have had a lovely year Brownies and Guides had an activity camp at Blacklands Farm in September and then a Radcliffe Under the Sea themed weekend including a trip to Brighton sea life centre.

In the Autumn term the Brownies learned how to make Christmas Cake and ice it, they had a silent disco which wasn't silent... In the Spring we did a badge with the RSPB at Southwark Park, we made animal masks, played beetle drive, and crazy chameleons. This term we pretended to be gladiators at Frylands Wood and learned practical first aid. We did our annual Rounders match with families and a picnic in the park this week. We are doing a sponsored skip next week for the British Heart Foundation. We are always very busy and aim to do a range of sporting, crafting and cooking which the girls love.

We have redone all the storage in the cupboard, removed the doors and put in better shelves. Plastic boxes with lids all match and all are labelled. The shed is also tidy. We have lovely resources they are all used and loved. For anyone taking over they would not need to spend much money at all. The bank accounts are healthy and all the planning is there and ready to use. I can share all my letters and organisation tips etc.

Social Life in Our Lady's – The Ballroom of Romance

The Social Life of our Parish **provides a sense of community and belonging**. The activities offer opportunities to meet new people, make friends, and network. They also help our members to develop new skills and interests and provide support and encouragement. In addition, social activities can be a great way to get involved in our community and make a difference.

The Parish Records highlight that there has been a range of Social Activities available for the last 60+ years. In 1961, the Parish Priest, Fr John McKenna saw a need for a meeting place for the lonely and the elderly. He was a great believer in ecumenism; long before it became fashionable, he approached the Ministers of other local churches. Each of four Churches: Our Lady's, St Mildred's, St Mary's (Canning Road) and Shirley Methodist, plus a group from the Inner Wheel provided a team to run the Unity Club and serve refreshments in the Church Hall.

From these small beginnings the Unity Club flourished, had a membership of 120+ and weekly attendances of 80-90 members. The programme of events included film shows, bingo and whist drives. The Club organised several outings every year with parties at Christmas & Easter and a Birthday Party in November. The Unity Club continued every week until the C19 *Virus* in March 2020.

The Social Club opened in November 1976; in the early years the programme included Dances, Discos, Puppet Shows and Bingo sessions. In the current day, the Club is providing a wide range of activities which include Entertainment for Dancing every Sunday evening, a range of Tribute Events throughout the year, fundraising events in partnership with local Charities and the annual Strictly Come Dancing competition. Our events are very well supported, and the Club has a membership of approximately 200 members. It is a place that Members have met many new Friends and enjoy the range of activities provided. The Club has had many names over of years but is now affectionately known at the *Ballroom of Romance*! Some of our current Members joined the Social Club after experiencing severe challenges within their own personal lives such as illness, bereavement & separation. Many Members have highlighted that they look forward to attending the weekly events particularly during the winter months.

We are also very fortunate to work in partnership with many groups within the Parish Community including the Set Dancing Group, the Addiscombe Youth Club, and the Wednesday Club.

The Club is a non-profit making organisation; all proceeds raised are given to Charities at local, national, or global level. In the last financial year, over £55,000.00 was given to a range of charities, including Anerley ACROSS, Brain Tumour Charity, King's College Hospital: Critical Care Centre & Round Towers GFC.

At the start of the C19 Virus, the Social Club identified a need to keep in touch with its members; a weekly electronic Newsletter was set up providing a wide range of information including Birthday & Family celebrations, Poems & Music clips, and items from Members & their Friends. The 100th edition was published in February 2022. The Club then commenced the publication of a monthly Newsletter, which has now reached its 28th Edition. The first edition of the Newsletter in March 2020 was sent to 50 Email contacts; the most recent edition of the monthly Newsletter was sent to 500+ contacts. The document provides a review of recent events and highlights of the forthcoming programme of social activities.
